
What's around

Family: POACEAE

The grass family

Two formidable native grasses - Microlaena stipoides and Themeda australis







Themeda australis
Kangaroo Grass
Tufted perennial.
Does not persist well under heavy grazing, and can be outcompeted by introduced grasses.
Themeda from Arabic thamed - clay-pan; australis from Latin - southern.

Both these grasses are spreading on the Ridge. *Microlaena* is forming large pools of bright green at the expense of the exotic grasses. In moments of pessimism I wonder if it is doing *too* well.

Cooleman Trig

My yelp for help was answered by long-time member David who has volunteered to caretake Cooleman Trig and to keep the pamphlet box charged. We met on the frosty summit to look at the problems and go through the dispiriting plant list I had compiled - 34 species of which 14 are exotic. The predominant scourge is Spurge Euphorbia depauperata and we found it to have a challenging root system: David is going into action with assorted geological tools. The cairn has been partially demolished and the question remains - what to do with the now-untidy pile of rock (all local, David tells me). \Box

Stop press

Today, June 5th, Malcolm, Gösta and I met Rod Hillman (East District Manager of Environment ACT) to view the earth works above Chauvel Circle and inside CNP. The project was discovered by Athlon Drive rangers during a routine inspection last Friday and immediately reported to

Rod who had all activity stopped. Rod is sorting through a web of Transact, ACTEW, ACT Roads, their various

contractors and sub-contractors who have been rolling out cables, clearing sumps and goodness knows what else. With the imminent risk of erosion from the forecast rain, and the certainty of weed infestation in mind the denuded area has been covered by a dry-land mix of bitumenised hay and sown with ryecorn seed. This is a stop gap till Spring when carefully sourced *Themeda* will be sown.

We are impressed by the prompt and decisive action taken by Rod and his staff. \circ
