Public Liability Insurance

Two weeks ago following a direction from ACT Environment, I asked all members of our Group to cease working on the Ridge. This direction arose out of concerns about public liability insurance coverage for any injuries sustained by volunteers while working in the parks.

Ann Connolly and I have been working for the last two weeks to provide insurance cover for our Group. As of 9 July 2002, the Cooleman Ridge Group has become a member of the Southern ACT Catchment Group. Membership with this umbrella group provides us with public liability insurance cover while we are working in the ACT nature parks. The policy including personal accident insurance cover for volunteers is also still in place.

Thank you for your patience. I hope you have enjoyed a well-earned rest from the Ridge. ACT Environment has advised that members of our Group may now recommence work on the Ridge.

The Southern ACT Catchment Group will be discussing the current status of public liability insurance at its meeting on 23 July 2002. I will provide you with updated information on this matter after that meeting.

Family: CONVOLVULACEAE


Dichondra repens Kidney Weed

Perennial herb with creeping stems, rooting at nodes.

Di means 2; Greek chondros a grain, referring to the typical 2 fruitlets of the genus.

repens - Latin creeping

The leaf is sometimes confused with that of the violet. O



Family APIACEAE Hydrocolyle laxiflora Stinking Pennywort

Perennial herb with creeping rhizomes, rooting at nodes. Greek *hydro* water + *cotyle* cup or plate (referring to the little hollow in the middle of the leaf.

Latin laxa loose or open, flora flower.
